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2021 Annual Report

ello everyone from RSA, I hope this message finds you well and safe. I cannot believe the new year is already almost through its second month.



I am happy to deliver the Annual Report for 2021, which was a busy year for all. The year's highlight was finally agreeing to labor language with the County and completing a memorandum of understanding (MOU) for the Law Enforcement Bargaining Unit. We were able to remove several unfair terms imposed on us by the former Sheriff. The new MOU also brought POST pay back for all hours worked and a number of other positive language changes.

We continued to expand our outreach to members during this past year. We finished and opened our Desert Office, RSA East, in the City of Rancho Mirage. This will allow members to access services in person without having to drive to Riverside to take care of Association business. We are working hard to ensure we can keep the Office open Monday through Thursday and should be adding a Benefit Trust employee very soon.

On the operations front, your RSA Board of Directors collaborated with the Riverside Sheriffs' Association Legal Defense Trust to add an additional Labor Rep spot, with extensive knowledge of Corrections operations. In addition, the Board was also able to hire a new Executive Director who

brings an extensive list of experience to the Association that will immediately benefit our membership.

We continued our personal outreach to members with the help of the Riverside County Deputy Sheriff Relief Foundation (RCDSRF). During 2021, we were able to visit multiple stations and facilities, supporting several Department-sponsored special operations and events with our Rollin' Smokehouse and Chow Shack. The Smokehouse and Chow Shack crew was able to feed 9,000 members/people while also raising money for the RCDSRF.

We remained politically active in both local and state politics, fighting off the continued attacks on our profession. Our significant support and help resulted in the election of Ed Delgado to the Moreno Valley City Council. We responded to requests of local POA partners and helped them fend off significant budget cuts while also maintaining Public Safety taxes to support their departments. Our suc-

cessful efforts have grown our name and brand throughout the State.

Our major goals in 2022 include getting the MOU for Corrections and Probation finalized. RSA will continue to clean up several years of pieced together MOU language for Probation so we can produce a clean MOU. We will also seek to expand our membership by adding the Welfare Fraud Investigators to the RSA. They are full-time peace officers and should be represented by and with peace officers.

RSA is here to serve its Members from, "East to West," by serving those who serve. Your Board of Directors is always seeking ways to better our support of the membership. The best ideas often come from you, so if you have any ideas on how RSA can improve on member service, please don't hesitate to share those suggestions.

Your ideas will be relayed to the Board of Directors for consideration. As always, stay safe out there and help ensure your partners go home safe. ★

The Bills Are Arriving...

during the last few weeks as the bill introduction deadline approaches. Hundreds of bills have already been introduced, with hundreds more expected. As you can see, many of the bills seek to improve public safety in some way while others continue to advance criminal justice "reforms."

A recent statewide survey revealed that California voters are overwhelmingly supportive of measures to curtail the negative public safety impacts associated with Props 47/57. This represents a significant shift from their views in 2020 when voters rejected Prop. 20 which would have accomplished many of the same goals.

We are monitoring the following bills and will be announcing our positions on these and the other measures that will be introduced and amended over the next few weeks.

As you can see, many of these bills are expected to keep law enforcement advocates in Sacramento quite busy this year, but please feel free to reach out to us with any questions or concerns you may have about these or any other bills.

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AB 1751 Expanded, SB 213 Presumption Expanded

ssembly Bill 1751 was originally passed and provided certain factors that create a presumption that if the worker developed COVID-19 within fourteen days that the worker performed services at the employment place or at the direction of the employer, and if the diagnoses of the COVID-19 was made by a medical doctor, doctor of occupational medicine, state licensed physician assistant, or a nurse practitioner, that the diagnoses of COVID-19 was confirmed by the COVID-19 test within thirty days of diagnoses, that there is a presumption that this disease was job-related if the worker fell within certain classifications of a firefighter, peace officer or providing care for the person that does have COVID-19 as set forth in 3212.87.

This legislation mandated that the, again, worker test positive of COVID-19 within fourteen days that the worker performed labor services at the place of employment, and the presumption expires as of January 1, 2023.

A new bill was set forth on February 3, 2022 that has extended the presumption to expire in January 1, 2025, therefore extending it two years.

This presumption unfortunately is reflective of the ongoing COVID concerns that we have. It is necessary to protect those individuals that are protecting us.

The Senate passed the presumption and this bill has moved forward to the Assembly for hearings, if any, that they want to place on this matter.

Again, the COVID-19 presumption is a necessity as to the disease and the infectious nature of it as well as protecting those that are protecting us.

There was a Senate Bill that passed, (Senate Bill 213) that creates presumptions for various medical conditions for hospital workers. This bill will expand the coverage to people within presumptions that were set forth for certain cancers, musculoskelatal injuries, post-traumatic stress disorder and some infectious diseases, pulmonary disease and very importantly COVID-19. This expansion that is suggested again creates an umbrella of protection for other people that protect our society. SB 213 Senator, Dave Cortese of San Jose, will be hashed out further in the Assembly.

It should be noted that there was previous legislation also offered that has impact for care, and this is

Assembly Bill 1400 (AB 1400). This Assembly Bill created a single-payer and the cost of the bill was not reflected in the Assembly Bill, and it is anticipated that the annual cost revenue needed would be four hundred billion dollars to achieve this passage of bill to extend medical coverage to a great number of people. This bill has run into many hiccups relative to the actual cost and implementation of same. At this point in time the bill itself is in a delayed status. Many of the reviewers feel that the estimated cost. between \$314 billion — \$391 billion. does not really reach the point of the cost. This included a 2.3% excise tax on businesses with more than \$2 million in annual gross receipts; a 1.25% payroll tax on employers with 50 or more workers; a 1% payroll tax on workers earning more than \$49,900; and a progressive surtax to start at 0.5% on income over \$149,509 and rising to 2.5% at \$2,484,121 (said San Jose Assemblyman Ash Kalra, the bill's author). Lest anyone think

single-payer is dead, Mr. Kalra said "this is only a pause" and "we will not give up."

The single-payer system in the current verbiage of AB1400 exempts workers' compensation and provides extended care. The program would be called the California Guaranteed Health Care Act and the program, or Cal Care, is to provide comprehensive universal singlepayer coverage and place coverage on all residents of the state of California.

All residents does not mandate if the individual be a citizen of the United States, just a resident and it is a very liquid term (the term residence).

The reality is the extension of the care, how far it will go and the anticipation even though it's not included, the change that can occur in the bill at a later date to incorporate workers' compensation and its single-payer bill. There are many challenges and problems that currently exist within the Utilization Review and Independent Medical Review in California. The idea that the single-payer bill could resolve it, there have been discussions of same. Again, this does not address the issue as to the artificial limitations that currently are there in accessing medical care, Utilization Review and Independent Medical Review.

TAX TRAP

Another significant consideration that the worker needs to be aware of is mis-information that can emanate from the bookkeeper or accountant on the determination as to whether the money derived is taxable under the retirement system.

Under the retirement system, whether it is a local city, County Retirement Act 1937 or CalPERS, they have established a threshold that once the condition is established as job-related and the medical condition that is established as work-related within certain parameters precludes the worker from doing their substantial duties, the first fifty percent of the income is received on a





retirement is not subject to taxation. The rationale for that goes back to the populous that this protects and whether it be fire, police, deputy sheriff, police officers or highway patrol, there is a recognition in the trained experience that they have does not foster a lot of job opportunities that are available for other people that have a disability that forces them to leave. Therefore, this concept of the first fifty percent not being subject to taxation if certain thresholds are met by the retirement boards is to protect and provide economic security for those people that have injuries that impact their employability at a later stage.

Unfortunately there has been a segment of people that are doing taxes for safety members that come

doing your substantial duties and the governing agency of your retirement system agrees with that, the first fifty percent of your retirement is not subject to taxation and has no bearing or impact relative to the percentage of disability you will receive from workers' compensation. This awareness is important as I have seen this occur where the tax person so far the ones that I have seen that count this are not CPAs, accountants but they are book keepers or people that market themselves as tax experts. Fortunately in most cases the knowledgeable worker will not fall for that Tax Trap that will come back and cause them harm at a later stage.

Anticipate that the medical care is going to be re-examined again.

employer, either through insurance or their self-insured program, provide coverage for the work-related injuries.

The single-payer system shifts the economic responsibility away from a particular employer and puts it on all of society.

By having the economic responsibility placed on particular employers for harm and injuries that occur, this motivates them to change and modify their work position lessening the likelihood of a work-related injury.

The single-payer system is one that allows all employers to remove their economic responsibility and place it on all taxpayers.

This change does not encourage a healthier work situation. It is unfortunate that the characterization of the

back and try to draw a parallel that the level of percentage of disability they derive in workers' compensation is a level of disability that is not taxable when it comes to retirement.

The permanent impairment determined in workers' compensation is separate and distinct from the fifty percent that is found in the retirement system that is non-taxable.

Those workers' that follow this legally incorrect recommendation by their tax person, that the level of percentage in disability that they have in workers' compensation is equal to the same level is not taxable are subjecting themselves to an investigative process by the IRS, penalties and sanctions.

Therefore, if you have a condition that is job-related, and if the job-related condition precludes you from

Anticipate that the presumptions on the COVID-19 should pass extending that. Anticipate that the employers will look at the single-payer system as a way to create more control over the worker.

There are some writers that think that the single-payer system may remove the determination from the employer as to the need of medical care. The overlapping problem that exist is the lack of judicial review that is not available in the single-payer system that currently exists. As it is now, even though there are challenges, there can be rights to appear and go forward that in some workers' compensation cases do have hopefully a judicial decision based upon substantial evidence.

The California workers' compensation system mandates that the

system has some sunlight that is being sold that is similar to when Utilization Review and Independent Medical Review was sold. It was thought that Utilization Review and Independent Medical Review would benefit the worker, which it has not. The blind perspective that people are assuming this will solve the problem, does not. The employer that has a work environment that places workers at risk or causes injury should be economically responsible for that either through the insurance or self-insured. This will not motivate the employer to adapt or make changes to make the work place less of a health threat to the worker. This requires an in depth study that has not been done to look at the shift of liability away from the employer and impact on the workers. *

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

You're a great cop and a great firefighter, not a money wizard or financial advisor. I get it. Nobody taught us in school. It definitely wasn't taught in the academy.

I hope to change this with those of you willing to learn. As with any growth or change in life, it starts with a mindset.

Money is no different. With that, I'd like to share with you six common money myths about your money and the mindset behind it.

1: I HAVE TOO MUCH DEBT TO SAVE MONEY AND BUILD WEALTH.

NO. YOU DON'T. START NOW, START SMALL.

If you have a mortgage, student loans, a car loan, and a maxed-out credit card or two, you are not alone. But just because everyone is doing it, doesn't mean you should. When you realize most, if not all, of your paycheck is going toward these expenses with nothing leftover, it's time to start making some changes. We won't fix that in this newsletter but know there is a solution. I'll give you a hint: it starts with spending less on the things you don't really need and prioritizing habits. "But wait, Eric ... I thought you just said I need to spend less to save more." Yes...but that's not the ONLY way to grow your net worth. As you start this process and take an active approach to your finances, you'll find tracking your expenses and working within a budget are great starters.

However, looking at ways to boost your income will significantly accelerate this snowball of money growth. If this sounds a lot like "side hustle", it's because that's exactly what I'm referring to. A sidehustle can be anything from selling old books in your garage

on Offer Up or Amazon to capitalizing on a skill or passion you already have. It could be a 2nd job or signing up for a little extra overtime designed specifically for investing, not spending. Think about what you have, what you know, or what you can learn to generate extra income. Trust me, it's there for you to find.

3: THE BANK IS THE BEST PLACE TOPUT YOUR MONEY.

IT'S NOT.

Inflation will eat your money. It's as bad as putting it under your pillow. Now THIS is something we were taught growing up. Unfortunately, this is old, antiquated advice. In the 1980's you could earn as much as 16% on your money in the bank. Today ... not so much. Sure, it's "safe" and FDIC insured, but you're losing money with the current rate of inflation tipping the scale at 5%. Your savings account is paying you 0.01% (NOTHING) but your purchasing power is diminishing at 5% a year... and projected to get worse! At the current rate of inflation, \$100 in the bank today won't buy you a pack of gum in 20 years! You need to grow that \$100 to keep up with or outpace inflation. So, learn to put your money somewhere else and make it grow. We'll dive much deeper on this down the road.



4: I NEED TO HAVE A Lot of money to invest.

NOPE. START WITH \$100 AND INCREASE IT OVER TIME. YOU'LL BE SURPRISED AT HOW MUCH YOU HAVE IN A SHORT TIME. THINK SNOWBALL.

If you're living paycheck to paycheck, you're probably having a hard time putting money aside for retirement or in an investment account. But you should force yourself to start saving even a small amount each paycheck. The reason for this has to do with a concept called compounding interest. Compounding interest helps you to "snowball" your money over time. For example, a mere \$100 every two weeks can snowball into \$400,000 in 30 years! Plan to set more aside at every step increase or promotion. The peaceof mind knowing you have \$1,000, \$10,000, or \$50,000 extra in savings or retirement will give you a sense of comfort, accomplishment, and more importantly options.

5: I WILL NEED TO MAX OUT MY PERS TIME IN ORDER TO RETIRE.

YOU DO NOT HAVE TO WAIT 30 YEARS TO RETIRE. MAKE A PLAN TO RETIRE EARLIER. IT'S A CHOICE.

you're making a difference in your organization or community, then go for it. But if you truly want freedom to spend more time with your family doing the things that life has to offer, then you need to plan it now. Rather than banking on working longer in life, adopt a mindset that you can retire on your terms. Compounding growth will help you build your nest egg. Start now. Educate yourself. Make it happen. It is possible to retire well before you "max out".

6: YOU SHOULD WORK WITH APROFESSIONAL TO MANAGE YOUR FINANCES.

LEARN TO DO IT YOURSELF. IT'S NOT DIFFICULT.

There is nothing wrong with hiring someone to help you manage yourmoney, but that should not prevent you from taking an active role in your own financial growth. Learning basic mone and investing concepts is not difficult.

By understanding how to better save, invest, and grow your money

Some financial services out there come with some hefty fees that add up over time. You have options. Boost your financial literacy by listening to podcasts on money, reading books on finance and investing, or finding a good YouTube channel to follow. 

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
